If someone were to ask you, **"What is the most important question for which you would like a definite answer?"** I am sure you would get a lot of different responses. Many young people today would probably wish to know **"Whom or when should I marry?"** or a young graduate **"What career path should I aim for?"** Or for some young parents **"How should we bring up our children so they will walk with the Lord?"** As important as all these questions are, one of the most crucial asked is the one that Jesus asked His disciples **"Who do you say I am?"** How you answer that question will not only determine how you live your life but where you end up in Eternity!

The reason why this is such a crucial question is that it demands our whole-hearted commitment, worship and

obedience. And this is the reason why Jesus is a controversial figure, as He demands our all. He doesn't allow us to view Him with just a historical detachment

C. S. Lewis points this out in his book *Mere Christianity* when he says, **"A man who was merely a man and said the sort of things Jesus said would not be a great moral teacher. He would either be a lunatic on the level of a man who says he is a poached egg, or he would be the devil of hell. Let us not come with any patronizing nonsense about his being a great human teacher. He has not left that open to us. He did not intend to."**

This is clearly shown by Jesus when He brings His disciples to the point where they were confronted to identify who He really and truly is. **"Who do you say that I am?"** is a pointed question. He's targeting it directly to His disciples. And really there is no more important question that He could ask them. Think about it. These are the men He has chosen. He's training them, He's equipping them and eventually He's going to send them out to tell others about who He is, to build the church, to go and to witness to the ends of the earth. It's absolutely paramount that they know who Jesus is, that they know His true identity. And Peter declared, **"You are the Christ"** - four

simple words and yet infinitely significant and profound.

What does that call for, what does that mean that Jesus is the Christ? It means that He's going to suffer, and He'll be rejected, and He's going to die and He'll rise on the third day. That's what it means to be the Christ.

He is completely unique. He doesn't fit into our categories. He doesn't match popular expectations. He's so much greater than anything we could ever conceive. He is the Christ. That's who Jesus is. He is the Christ. And there's no more important question that we could ask than this - *Who do you say that Jesus is?* He's the Christ. He has come. He is the Saviour of sinners and the Lord of all. If we can say with Peter in faith, **"You are the Christ,"** then all that we do is in Christ and it's for Christ and it's to His honour and His glory and His grace is sufficient for us to meet every need and to satisfy our deepest desires. Jesus is the Christ is a profoundly important and significant statement.

Will you see Him in His greatness and His power and His mercy and His love? Will you trust in Him as the Christ? Will you trust in Him as your Saviour and know the joy and the peace and the hope of being a child of God? Will you call on Him and confess Christ's name?

To call on Jesus Christ will set you at disagreement with the ways of the world. At times it will set you at disagreement with your own desires. But Jesus is the Christ and that means that for us to proclaim that, for us to confess that, there should be a distinctiveness about us. John Stott once said that the worst thing you could say to a Christian is, **"But you are no different from anybody else."** We should be expecting opposition from the crowds. We should expect to be

different from the culture at large. We should be ready to let go of the dreams and desires of our peers outside the church because Jesus is the Christ. He will come again and He will right all wrongs and He will vindicate His people and He will bless us beyond all of our imaginations.

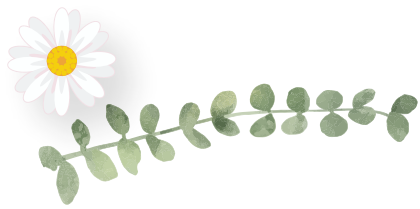

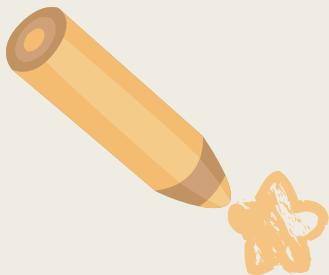

What inspired you to do this mission?

But I found out that He wanted more than my prayer, he wanted me to be the messenger of the Good News. After a long internal battle, I boarded a plane (by faith) and went to Mongolia.

I have always been a sportsman, but never realized that God could use my skill and passion for sport to serve Him. It is amazing to me that God can even use my love for sport as a tool to reach people with the Gospel; it is a privilege for me to serve that ingenious God. Or maybe He put that love in my heart, knowing I could use it to His glory.

What are the major difficulties you face in your ministry?

When your hobby turns into your work, then the purpose changes. It changes from a fun and relaxing activity to a more demanding one. This is when you put down the importance of winning earthly rewards like medals and trophies, but begin to focus on winning heavenly rewards; the eternal crown.

The obstacles are big and challenging, the devil becomes our strongest opponent and he tries to destroy every good deed and plan we have, there is a continuous battle with our enemy.

Narrowing down to the culture, Mongolians are/were nomads and so they follow a nomadic culture where team work is rare. It is individualistic and therefore, coaching team sports is not an easy job. I found teammates fighting among themselves more than fighting with their opponents. Friendly games are not often very friendly. Pride comes before the skill; many men refuse to give up fighting for the sake of argument. All these causes a great stress for a leader to bring God's peace and love through such a platform.

How do you evaluate success and balance your search for talent and spiritual growth?

We serve a faithful and a loving God, amidst all short comings and challenges He still enables us to do things and see little fruits from the seeds we have planted. God has been so faithful that few footballers from our sports ministry play for the Mongolian National team.

But the greater joy is seeing some of these athletes with whom we have shared the Gospel responding and following Jesus today.

Apart from many other fruits we have seen and experienced, it is amazing that through this sport ministry a small youth fellowship has been born and around 30 young people come regularly on Sunday to worship Jesus and have fellowship with each other.
